From the Desk of Pastor Bjorge

Postmodernity is a buzzword thrown around by many these days. Modernity, to which postmodernity reacts, is widely believed to have started at the Treaty of Versailles in 1919 as a reaction to the Kaisers of Germany in an effort to use reason and logic so as to avert war in Europe.

Modernity has continued by and large unquestioned until quite recently. Modernity has impacted Christian development in that it's necessitated the Church to rationally explain the gospel using logical propositions (such as the "Four Spiritual Laws," not to mention countless books on doctrine, apologetics, and systematic theology).

Modernity relies on philosophy, knowledge, science, and that which is verifiable. Toward this end, the Church has made claims such as "The Bible is the infallible and inerrant Word of God. It is Truth!"

Postmodernity says, "You can explain all that to me until you're blue in the face; you can reason me into a corner and make claims that sound logically right and true, but guess what — I still don't buy it!"

Postmodernity esteems above all else experience and intuition. It's less concerned with what's logically right, but instead values what's meaningful and personal. Something is "true" when it "feels true." Authenticity is more important than authority. In fact, post-moderns cringe at authority. "What is authoritative to you is not authoritative to me." Experience trumps truths, principles and facts.

Today many of us live within postmodernity without even knowing it or calling it such. We sense that the modernity experiment of rationalism has failed us—after all, we still have war and injustice all around. How can authorities and truth claims bring the kind of peace and justice we crave?

Take, for example, the last presidential election. John Kerry said he had a plan, something he let us hear about every

chance he had. George W. Bush got in front of the American public and said, "It's hard to be a president. I know the leaders of other countries. I've worked with them. You can trust me to lead you." Not a word about a plan. He got elected because people today will choose character and authenticity over a plan any day.

All of this is to say, in a postmodern ethos, you can't convince anyone to believe anything. Instead, all you have is your character, your integrity, your authenticity, and your personal and deeply held confession of faith. Appealing to the authority of the Bible, the Church, tradition, a pastor or a writer accomplishes little if anything. All we have is our personal witness to what we've seen and heard and believe deeply within us, namely that *Jesus is alive*; that he is among us to *claim us as his own* and to *partner with us in changing this world*—in ushering in God's kingdom! No facts, no principles, no truth statements—simply our confession of faith.

And people listening to us are a lot like a jury. They have a number of witnesses parading before them in any given day, all giving testimony as to what they believe to be true. At the end of the day, the jury will decide who gave their testimony most authentically. Then they will render a verdict. Of all these conflicting witness statements, whose rings the most compelling?

All any of us have are convictions to offer, not proofs! God has only called us to bear witness to what we have seen and heard. He's never called us to convince anyone of anything and any language that tries to convince will only be met with resistance and opposition. Our testimony is all we have and it's all the world wants to hear. It's what the Holy Spirit uses to bring transformation to the world. No amount of logic, bible verses, or sage advice will win the day—only our faithful, non-coercive, heart-felt confession that Jesus Christ is Savior and Lord!

March Church Council Actions

At its March meeting, the First Lutheran Church Council discussed and/or voted on the following items:

- Gave approval to seek a pastoral intern from the Western Mission Cluster (Luther Seminary and PLTS). If an intern is assigned to FLRB, that individual would begin this fall.
- Approved the recommendation of a task force studying the purchase of new coffee makers. The new system will now be purchased and installed in the kitchen.
- Approved the purchase and installation of a projector and screen in the worship area. This would be implemented this spring with hopes of beginning its use by June 1st if not before.
- Discussed adding visitor parking and more handicapped parking places near the facility.
- Synod Assembly will take place May 16-17 in Everett and we are encouraged to bring 4 delegates along with our rostered staff members. Those delegates are currently being sought.
- Heard a recommendation from the Finance Team to change the process of the Tellers. The Finance Team will bring final recommendations to the

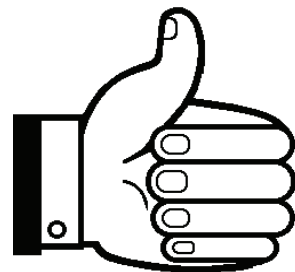
which are hungry for the Word and eager to live out their Lutheran faith, but they are unable to support a full-time pastor.

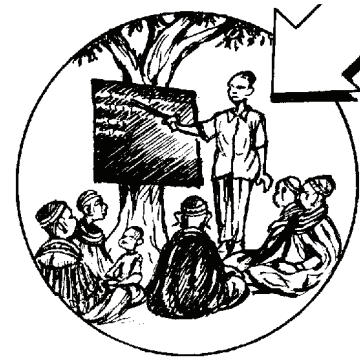

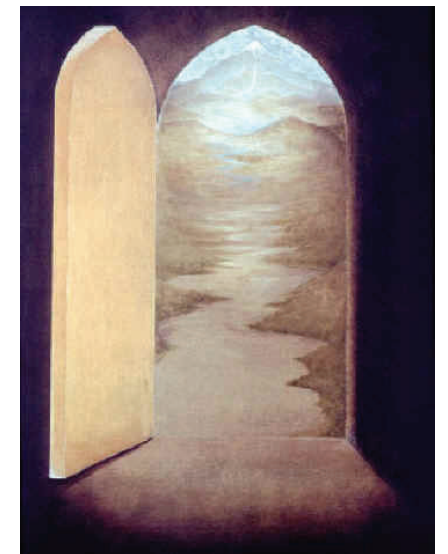
Entering *THEIR* World!

Eugene Peterson, in his paraphrase of 1st Corinthians 9:19-23, writes:

Even though I am free of the demands and expectations of everyone, I have voluntarily become a servant to any and all in order to reach a wide range of people: religious, non-religious, meticulous moralist, loose-living immoralists, the defeated, the demoralized—whoever. Preschool News - Family Faith Walks—April Muddy Day Madness

“He lifted me out of the slimy pit, out of the mud and mire; He set my feet on a rock and gave me a firm place to stand.” Psalm 40:1-3

Faith Walk:

Put on grubby clothes and take a walk outside on a muddy day. Experience some muddy day madness. Stomp in the mud. Touch it with your hands. Squish it. Relish the experience.

Faith Talk:

- What does the mud feel like? What would happen if you jumped into a really deep puddle of mud or drove a car into it?
- Read all three verses of the passage. What was David's experience?
- What hope do these verses give us?

Faith Activities:

- Look for sticky substances in your home (for example, cookie dough, glue, and syrup). Touch and describe each substance. What sticky situations are in your life? How can you keep from getting permanently stuck to them?
- Pray for someone who is experiencing a low point in his or her life.
- Plant a seed in some mud. God can plant hope in the mud in our lives and grow it into a beautiful plant.

When I fly high with the joy of Your love, You rejoice with me and cheer me on. When I feel low and hurt, You hold me, comfort me and give me hope. Help me to know Your presence and love at all times. In the name of Jesus. Amen.*
