I faithfully believe this is true.

As Christians, we're committed to following Jesus Christ, loving our neighbor, and we continue to be informed by the scientific community. You will see in this Beachcomber that our staff is working hard to provide ministry through as many channels and mediums of communication as possible.

I hope and pray that each week you are being fed spiritually and, in the context of our current challenges as a nation, finding ways to grow as disciples. Tune into our weekly worship service online. We're working to make that even more accessible and hope to soon provide DVDs of the service to those without internet. Make sure you receive the weekly eBlast emails with vital information as to what's going on. That same group of emails will also receive a weekly video meditation from myself or one of the staff. Join our weekly "Zoom of Life" bible class each Wednesday at 11:00 am. Be a part of our Sunday virtual coffee hour hosted by Amy Day. Join Cathy Thomas for an online prayer time. Connect with Terry for online Sunday School (for both children and parents). Join Joel in his virtual musical gatherings. There are many opportunities to connect with one another at FLRB even now and our staff has done a tremendous job adapting their ministry areas in light of our current situation. Please know that you are each, individually, by name, in my prayers. My heart yearns for God's people to come back together—to worship, serve, pray, fellowship, give, laugh, learn, grow, and care for one another again. That day will come! I faithfully believe that. EVENING VESPERS



CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILY MINISTRY

Wow! What a spring and summer it has been. In the fall when I started planning this summer I never could have guessed what was coming. I think that this is a sentiment that is repeated by so many of us each day. This year our lives have been turned upside down in a way that none of us could have prepared for.

As I reflect on this season of life there have been a few things that stand out. This is hard—it is hard on everyone in different ways but almost everyone is effected in some way. As a ministry leader who is called to walk through hard things with people that realization can be very overwhelming. However it is hard on everybody......wow how uniting is that. Early on in the pandemic as I was watching TV I realized that companies had already changed their commercials to reflect the fact that we were now all home and working remotely and what that meant for whatever product or message that they were trying to promote. This brought me hope. It had been so long since anything had been uniting. When I read the Bible over and over again what I hear about is God's uniting, and redeeming love and grace for all people. There will always be ways that divide us. It is the sinful nature in all of us that makes that not only possible but inevitable. REFUGEE FAMILY UPDATE

FLRB, in conjunction with St. Luke Parish, has been working through Lutheran Community Services NW to help settle a refugee family from Afghanistan.

Our refugee family of eleven arrived on February 13th and with the help of volunteers from the two churches, was soon moved into their apartment. Unfortunately, not long after, the coronavirus pandemic hit our state making interaction with the family much more difficult. Despite this, much has been accomplished in helping the family in the resettlement process. Two major issues have been obtaining financial support through DSHS and the mandatory health screening. All eleven family members have now had medical and dental appointments and have received their immunizations.

With the schools transitioning to online learning, another challenges has been enrolling the children in school and then getting the technology up and running so that both the children and adults could participate in online classes. In addition, many volunteers have spent countless hours tutoring the children and adults either online or in person. The father and the two oldest girls will be starting English Language Learning classes online at Edmonds College on July 1st.

With pandemic guidelines in mind, it also became necessary to hire the services of two professional women who speak Pashto, the language of our Afghanistan family. One is a teacher in the children's school and will be working this summer tutoring the children in preparation for school in the fall. The other woman is mainly helping the adults with interpreting and cultural adjustment.

The father and the two oldest girls are now in the process of applying for jobs. The pandemic has added to the difficulty of the job search since many places aren't hiring at this time or if they are, some English is required. So that he can start to support his family in his new home country, the father is very eager to get a job. He doesn't speak much English but if you know of a possible job opportunity, please contact either Judy Borrow or Karen Neumeister.

Many thanks to all the FLRB volunteers who have given of their time and talents to help this family. It truly does "take a village."

FLRB PRESCHOOL AND KINDERGARTEN

The end of the 2019-2020 school year brought many challenges and many moments of resilience. In alignment with the FLRB COVID-19 plan and the required Washington state school closures, we closed our in-person learning in mid-March and finished our school year through virtual learning. This was incredibly difficult as young children learn best in person. Our teachers did a tremendous job creating at home learning opportunities, sharing resources, hosting virtual classes, recording instructional videos, putting together take home learning packets, mailing activities to children and families, and more. The FLRB School Board followed through on a plan that involved applying for CARES Act funding, moving our fundraising online, partnering with families around tuition payments, and offering tuition assistance to every family asking for it. We have done our best with a difficult situation and I am so proud of the FLRB Preschool & Kindergarten team!



As we look ahead to the 2020-2021 school year with hope, we continue to be faced with many challenges. Safely reopening our doors means smaller class sizes, necessary personal protection equipment, increased cleaning and disinfecting practices and supplies, and a number of rigorous policies to protect the safety, health and well-being of each child, family and staff member.

Our reopening plan involves prioritizing the following health and safety areas:

- Reducing and/or maintaining small class sizes and low teacher to student ratios.
- Assuring that groups of children stay together with minimal exposure to other groups.
- Minimizing the use of shared spaces and classroom materials.
- Screening children and staff at drop off each day to check for signs of illness.
- Staggering our entrance locations and start and pick up times.
- Strengthening our daily cleaning and disinfecting practices.
- Following Washington State Department of Health guidelines regarding masks.
- Having a well-established plan in case we do need to provide learning-from-home content.

While these measures will go a long way in keeping our community safe, they are costly. With a decrease in tuition income due to smaller class sizes, our need for support for this ministry is great. There are many ways that you can support First Lutheran Preschool & Kindergarten this year:

- Make a donation to FLRB School. Your donation will support the increased need our families have for tuition assistance this year, help us cover the increased costs associated with maintaining the highest level of safety during this pandemic and will help us keep this ministry available.
- Consider serving on our FLRB School Board. This group of dedicated individuals provides guidance and support to the school in so many invaluable ways.
- Donate adult or child sized cloth face masks, disinfecting wipes, hand sanitizer, isopropyl alcohol or disposable gloves.
- Above all, we ask for your prayers for the children, families, staff and board as we all learn, play, teach, grow and stay safe together this year.
